Agriculture Holdings

Cultivated Area in the Emirate of Abu Dhabi is estimated at about 479,868 donums, of which 36% is Fruit Trees, 6% is Field Crops, and 3% is Vegetables. There has been a significant growth in the area of Cultivated Land over the Period From 2005 to 2015, mostly around Al Ain region, which has 60% of the Total area of Farm holdings in the Emirate.



Agricultural Producers Price Index

The Agricultural Producers Price Index has been increased by 12.8% in 2015 compared with 2014 (2010 = 100). Important crops that contributed to this rise are Turnip (47.2%), Parsley (43.4%), Mallow (38.0%), Beets (35.0%), Carrot (31.7%), Coriander (29.8%), Lettuce (27.9%), Cauliflower (26.6%), Watermelon (24.1%), Garden Rocket (21.1%), Sweet melon (15.8%), Corn (9.9%), and Pepper (9.7%).

On the other hand the APPI sub-indices for a number of crops, including Onion, Cabbage, Potato, Eggplant and Beans have been decreased by 36.3%, 28.2%, 28.2%, 21.4% and 21.2% respectively.

Fisheries

Fish is an important food and source of living and income for vast populations around the world. It is estimated that 95 percent of people relying on fish for their livelihood live in developing countries. A renewable natural resource, and the source of a basic food for coast inhabitants, fisheries are a significant component in the generation of national income.

The demand of fish is on the rise in recent years, a trend that is likely to continue in response to population growth, rise of income levels and improvements in dietary intake.

Abu Dhabi's 500 km coastline is rich in fish and other marine species, The emirate's territorial waters embrace over 200 islands varying in size and in historical and economic significance.

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
